






#### **Rebellion in America:**


fundamental differences lack of a rigid system of estates/privilege war for independence & political revolution

Louis XVI	the Last	1774-1792	














#### Origins of the French Revolution:

weak leadership of Louis XVI writings of the *philosophes* deficit financing (1/2 budget to service debt)

**NOT** class conflict (Marxist idea)

#### **Assembly of Notables – February 1787**

(150 influential men)

Called to discuss/support tax plan (which had not receive court approval) denounce idea and demand a meeting of <a href="Estates General">Estates General</a>

2nd Estate 270 nobility

3rd Estate 578




#### "The assembled nation cannot receive orders."

Louis XVI backs down, but... He commands an army of 107 regiments.

Orders troops to move to the Paris area.



20,000 royal troops - July, 1789

Louis XVI backs down, but...

Crop failures and grain shortages almost doubled the price of flour and bread.

Unemployed vagrants filled the roads.



#### "Mob rule equals a national holiday"

July 11 – fire Necker (Finance Minister)

July 12 – excite the mob army holds fire

July 13 – ransack St. Lazare take 52 wagons of wheat

July 14 – attack Bastille fortress 30,000 lb. of gunpowder




"Mob rule equals a national holiday – July 14, 1798"

Attack Bastille fortress 30,000 lb. of gunpowder

7 prisoners – 4 forgers, 2 noblemen with immoral behavior, 1 murder suspect

98 attackers and 1 defender killed during Several hours of combat.

Commander orders a cease fire. He is beaten, staffed and decapitated.





July 17 - Louis XVI visits Paris accepts a tricolore cockade






#### The Reconstruction of France

June 21, 1791

Royal Family

"Moved" back to Paris
Louis XVI "depressed"

Detailed plans to raise "armed congress", return and return to power



"High Treason and Crimes against the State" 693-0 (23 abstain, 26 absent) 93%

Death Penalty
361 to 360
(288 prison/exile+72 death w/ reprieve)
(50.07%)

"no compromise with Counterrevolution"




#### The Second Revolution

1793 *Marie-Antoinette* 

Oct. 3 National Convention ordered immediate trial by the Revolutionary Tribunal

"squandering of public money & secret contributions to her brother the Austrian emperor"

12 man jury returned guilty verdict. The only sentence was death and there was no right to appeal.



"public safety"

Price controls, execution of hoarders & speculators, force requisitions of grain

**Moderate republicans purged** from Convention

23 deputies expelled, tried, executed for treason

June 1793 – July 1794
Jacobin Dictatorship
"Committee of Public Safety"

Maximilien Robespierre – the Reign of Terror's 12th man

A state of mind that saw threats and plots everywhere.

Refractory priests banned from the Republic 300,000 ordinary citizens jailed under the "Law of Suspects"



16,000-40,000 executed by the Guillotine for "crimes against liberty"


**1793** Vendee



#### Ending the Terror & Robespierre

**Law of 22 Prairial (June 10, 1794) Court of Condemnation** (no need for witnesses)

Cult of the Supreme Being beyond deism

"He did not create kings to devour the human race. He did not create priests to harness us, like vile animals, to the chariots of kings..."

(July 27, 1794)


### Thermidorian Reaction

**Execution of Robespierre, etc. "White Terror"** 

Rescind economic controls high inflation

**Another poor harvest** 

monsieur or madame not "citizen"

#### **Decimal Time**

**5 October 1793** 

#### French Republican Calendar


New Year - autumnal equinox

12 months of 30 days

10 days in "week" (decades)

5 extra days at the end of each year were national holidays

**Abolished by Napoleon 1 Jan 1806**

Vendémiaire ("grape harvest") Brumaire ("fog")

Frimaire ("frost")

#### Winter:

Nivôse ("snow")

Pluviôse ("rain")

Ventôse ("wind")

Floréal ("flowering")

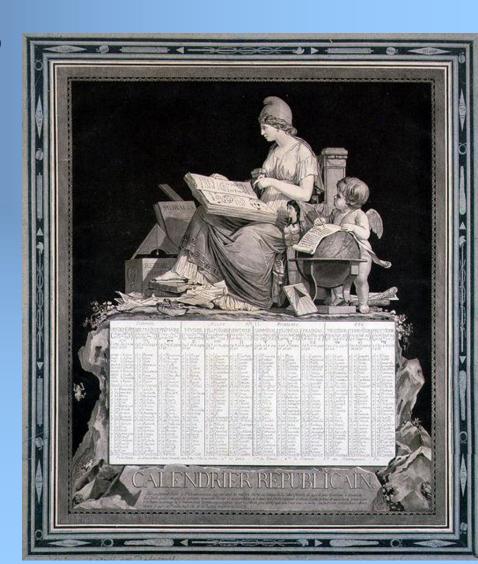
Prairial ("pasture")

#### **Summer:**

**Messidor** ("harvest")

Thermidor ("heat")

**5 October 1793** 

#### A Ten Hour Day


100 seconds = 1 minute

100 minutes = 1 hour


10 hours = 1 day

Suspended 7 April 1795

86,400 sec/day vs 100,000 "sec"/day



### Optical Telegraph



1793 – Claude Chappe27 word message3 stations/20 miles 11 minutes

**1794 – 15 stations 130 miles** 

1830s – 1,000 stations 8,000 miles
