



Technologies of Exploration


Navigation

Compass – direction

Astrolabe – position - latitude only

Dead Reckoning – guess speed & distance

Marine Chronometer – not until 1761

CARAVEL - latten and square rigged sails





CARRACK- larger, more cargo and sails

Niña – caravel – 50 ft long, 7 ft draft, 16 ft beam crew of 24

Pinta – caravel – 56 ft long, 8 ft draft, 18 ft beam crew of 26

Santa María – carrack - 62 ft long, 10 ft draft 18 ft beam, crew of 40


Niña caravel – 50 ft long, 7 ft draft, 16 ft beam crew of 24







The 3 G's + God religious fervor +convert natives + Gold +expand trade - esp. spices & precious metals profit + Glory + adventure power +national pride


Spanish Treasure Ships and the Manila Galleons






Christmas Bells

Till ringing, singing on its way, The world revolved from night to day, A voice, a chime, A chant sublime Of peace on earth, good-will to men!




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Then from each black, accursed mouth The cannon thundered in the South, And with the sound The carols drowned Of peace on earth, good-will to men!
